


Timor-Leste National Survey Results




- The survey was comprised of 1,500 residents of Timor-Leste who were 17 years of age or older at the time of the survey.
- Data was gathered through face-to-face interviews between randomly-selected household respondents and trained interviewers.
- Interviewers were selected from among members of the student body at Dili Institute of Technology and were supervised by faculty members and staff
- Multi-stage sampling was used to select sucos and aldeias from each of Timor-Leste's 13 districts to be included in the sample.
 - A suco is a recognized administrative area of land incorporated within a sub-district
 - An aldeia is the hamlet or village where the household dwelling is located.
- Household respondents were chosen using a Kish grid to randomly choose a participant among those residing at the home or dwelling.
- The estimated overall margin of sampling error is +/- 2.53 percent, although it differs for each individual question, resulting in a confidence interval of 5.06 percent within which the results may have varied due to sampling.
- Adjustments were made to proportionately weight the results for age, gender and geography toward the actual demographic and geographic characteristics of Timor-Leste.
- The interviewing was conducted during the period of November 10, 2008 to December 16, 2008.
- The survey was sponsored and commissioned by the International Republican Institute.
- Due to rounding percentages may not add up to 100 percent.












Survey Data Characteristics





Since the new government was formed last year, in your opinion, do you think Timor-Leste is better off, the same or worse off?







Since the new government was formed last year, has your financial situation gotten better, stayed the same or gotten worse?





Gotten Better Analyzed by District







In general, how would you rate the job the government of Timor-Leste is doing?







Timor-Leste Government Approval and Performance















Have you heard about the government's plan to create elected municipal assemblies?


Have you heard about the government's petroleum fund?



Among those who rely on newspapers for their main source of political information, 66% said they had heard of the government's petroleum fund




In general, how would you rate the government's use of petroleum fund money?






Do you favor or oppose the creation of an Anti-Corruption Commission?






In your opinion, are women more capable, equally as capable, or less capable than men to serve in elected positions in government?






Would you be willing to vote for a female political candidate in a future election?




Do you plan to vote in the upcoming Suco Council elections?





Do you think early parliamentary elections should be held?








Do you feel free to express your political opinions in the area where you live?




Do you feel free to express your political opinions in the area where you live?






How interested are you in political parties and candidates?






Will you consider voting for candidates of other parties in future elections?






In general, how satisfied are you with the political parties in Timor-Leste?




