
Detailed Methodology

- The survey was conducted on behalf of the International Republican Institute's Center for Insights in Survey Research by the Institute for Pakistan Public Opinion Research under the supervision of Redstone Scientific.
- Data was collected between November 1-22, 2018 through in-home, in-person interviews.
- The sample consists of 3,991 respondents aged 18 and older and is representative of voting-age adults nationally.
- The sample was distributed into 400 primary sampling units (PSU). For the purpose of this survey, PSUs were defined as wards in urban areas and villages in rural areas.
- The multi-stage probability sample was stratified by province, district, and urban and rural locations using the 2018 provisional results of the national census as the sample frame. The Probability-Proportional-to-Size (PPS) method was then used to select PSUs.
- In each PSU, after randomly selecting a centrally-located starting point, the Right Hand Rule and a skip pattern was used to select the appropriate household.
- Within each household, the Kish Grid was then used to select respondents 18 years and older. A gender quota was implemented to ensure female representation.
- Interview teams were comprised of both males and females.
- The survey oversampled Balochistan and KPK provinces; the sample was then post-weighted to ensure national representativeness. The sample was also post-weighted for gender.
- The confidence interval for the full sample is plus or minus 1.6 percent at the mid-range with a confidence level of 95 percent. As sub-groups have smaller sample sizes, the confidence interval will be higher, as is noted where appropriate.
- The response rate was 64 percent.
- The information in this report has been compiled in accordance with international standards for market and social research methodologies. Figures in charts and tables may not sum to 100 percent due to rounding.




In general, would you say that things in Pakistan are heading in the right direction or in the wrong direction?




In general, why do you think that things are heading in the right direction?

(Open-ended; respondents who said "right direction"; n=1,498)




In general, why do you think that things are heading in the wrong direction?



Thinking now about the following issues, would you rate the situation with each as good or bad? And would you say very good or very bad or just good/bad?




In the coming year, do you think that the situation with each of the following will get better, worse, or stay the same?




Thinking about your personal economic situation, over the past year has it improved, stayed the same, or worsened?

In the coming year, do you expect your personal economic situation is going to improve, stay the same, or worsen?




How would rate the current state of Pakistan's democracy? Would you say it is good or bad? And would you say that it is very or somewhat good/bad?








What is the single most important problem facing Pakistan?




On a scale of one to five, to what extent do you think that corruption is a problem in Pakistan, with one being not a problem at all and five being the most serious problem?




Have you ever had to pay a bribe to a public official?






Thinking now about the following institutions, would you say you approve or disapprove of the job they are doing? Do you strongly or somewhat approve/disapprove?




Thinking now about Prime Minister Imran Khan, do you think he is doing a good job or a bad job? Would that be a very good/bad job or just good/bad job?




Thinking about the new PTI federal government, do you think it is doing a good job or a bad job? Would that be a very good/bad job or just good/bad job?



Do you approve or disapprove of the PTI federal government's performance on each of the following issues?




How much time are you willing to give the new PTI federal government before you will expect it to start delivering on campaign promises?






Do you think your provincial government is doing a good job or a bad job? Would that be a very good/bad job or just a good/bad job?



Thinking now about the elected representatives that represent your area, how would you rate the job each of the following are doing?










Would you like to see new political parties in future elections or are you satisfied with the current choices?




Thinking now about the national elections that were just held in July [2018], to what extent do you think that the final results were accurate?



When it came to the counting of ballots and reporting of results, how transparent do you feel that the process was?




Thinking more about the election [in 2018], do you think that the election was free and fair or rigged?









Generally speaking, do you support or oppose creating new provinces in Pakistan?




Thinking now specifically about South Punjab, do you support or oppose making South Punjab a separate province?




Why do you support a separate province for South Punjab? (Open-ended; respondents who support a South Punjab province; n=1,568)

Thinking now about FATA*, do you support or oppose the merger of FATA into KPK*?






If there are two candidates running for office and they have the same qualifications aside from the fact that one is a man and one is a woman, which candidate are you more likely to support?




Which of the following would you say is the greatest barrier to increasing women's participation in politics?




Which of the following would you say is the greatest barrier to increasing women's participation in politics? (Disaggregated by gender)



Thinking now about youth in Pakistan (aged 35 years old and younger) what do you think is the biggest challenge they face? (Open-ended)









Thinking about your media habits, from which type of media are you most likely to get your news?




Thinking about this some more, which type of media do you find the most trustworthy?



Do you have access to the internet?




How often do you use the Internet? (Respondents with internet access; n=1,348)




Which of the following do you use?
