Survey Methodology


- ✓ <u>Dates of Interviewing</u>: The fieldwork was conducted June 30 July 13, 2011.
- ✓ <u>Data Collection Method:</u> Stratified-intercept methodology based on personal, face-to-face interviews in Cuba.
- ✓ <u>Sample Size:</u> 572 Cuban adults (age 18 and older).
- ✓ <u>Sample:</u> Interviews were conducted in fourteen (14) Cuban provinces: Ciudad de La Habana, Provincia de La Habana, Pinar del Río, Matanzas, Sancti Spiritus, Villa Clara, Cienfuegos, Ciego de Ávila, Camaguey, Holguín, Guantánamo, Las Tunas, Granma and Santiago de Cuba.
 - ✓ The sample was stratified by province, then by sub-units within each province. Interviewees were allocated by gender and age quotas. The final selection of each interviewee was random.
- ✓ <u>Respondents:</u> The sample selection for province, gender and age are based on the last available Cuban census data, released in 2002.
- ✓ <u>Maximum Sample Margin of Error:</u> Margin of error of ± four percent for a 95 percent level of confidence.




Demographics: Gender and Age









Demographics: Province






Demographics: Education and Race








Demographics: Profession or Job








Demographics: Receiving Remittances from Family Members or Friends Abroad








What do you think is the biggest problem in Cuba?






What do you think is the biggest problem in Cuba? (by gender)








What do you think is the biggest problem in Cuba? (by age)






What do you think is the biggest problem in Cuba? (by remittances)






Do you believe the current government will succeed in solving Cuba's biggest problem in the next few years?





Do you believe the current government will succeed in solving Cuba's biggest problem in the next few years? (by gender)




Do you believe the current government will succeed in solving Cuba's biggest problem in the next few years? (by age)




Generally speaking, would you say things in Cuba are going very well, well, so-so, badly or very badly?






Generally speaking, would you say things in Cuba are going very well, well, so-so, badly or very badly? (by gender)






Overall, would you say your family's economic situation has gotten worse, improved or stayed the same from one year ago?





(by age)






Do you think the economic situation of your family, during the next 12 months...?





Do you think the economic situation of your family, during the next 12 months...? (by age)














Do you have access to the Internet or e-mail?






How often do you have access to your e-mail or the Internet?






Do you regularly use a cellular phone?






Do you regularly use a cellular phone? (by age)





Do you regularly use a cellular phone? (by Internet access)






There has been discussion on the part of Cuba's leaders for reforms to the Cuban system, are actual reforms taking shape?














Beyond what has been discussed, what reform would be most beneficial to you?






Beyond what has been discussed, what reform would be most beneficial to you? (by age)
