Methodology

The survey was conducted by the public opinion and market research company Baltic Surveys/The Gallup Organization on behalf of the International Republican Institute. The field work was carried out by Rating Group Ukraine.

The main sample consisted of 1,200 permanent residents of Ukraine aged 18 and older and eligible to vote. It is representative of the general population by age, gender, education and religion.


Data were collected on August 27 – September 9, 2013 through face-to-face interviews with the respondents. The margin of error does not exceed plus or minus 2.8 percent. The response rate was 64 percent.

The sample design was a multi-stage random sample. The closest birthday rule was used for selection of the respondent. The households were selected using the random route method.


- <u>Stage one</u>: Ukraine is divided into 27 official administrative regions (25 regions of Ukraine, Kiev and Sevastopol). All regions of Ukraine were surveyed.
- <u>Stage two</u>: selection of the settlements towns and villages. Settlements were selected at random. The number of selected settlements in each region was proportional to the share of population living in a particular type of the settlement in each region. Towns were grouped into subtypes according to the size:
 - City more than one million residents
 - City 500,000-999,000
 - City 100,000-499,000
 - City 50,000-99,000
 - City to 50,000
 - Village
- <u>Stage three</u>: primary sampling units were described.


Generally speaking, do you think that things in Ukraine are going in the right direction or wrong direction?



Over the last 12 months, how has the financial situation of your household changed?




In the next 12 months, how do you expect the economic situation in Ukraine to change?




Do you think it is acceptable or not if some groups of people use the following methods of protests? How acceptable is each of these forms?




Do you think it is acceptable or not if some groups of people use the following methods of protests? How acceptable is each of these forms? May 2013




If Ukraine was able to enter only one international economic union, with whom should it be?




What is your expectation, will Ukraine and the European Union sign the Association Agreement in November 2013?




Which side will benefit more from the possible integration of Ukraine to the European Union?




Which side will benefit more from the possible integration of Ukraine to the Customs Union with Russia?




If signed in November 2013, do you think the Association Agreement with the European Union will have positive or negative consequences for Ukraine?



What possible consequences will the signing of the Association Agreement between Ukraine and the European Union have for Ukraine in these particular areas?






What are the most important problems facing Ukraine?




What are the most important problems facing residents of Ukraine?




If pre-term parliamentary elections were announced today, would you vote in such elections?




If Ukrainian presidential elections were held next Sunday, would you vote in such elections?




Do you feel that the next presidential election will be free and fair?




In the past two years, has the situation in the following areas improved or worsened?




How many times per week do you access the Internet?


